

## **EGG RECALL UPDATE:**

### **James Farm Brand Eggs:**

All James Farms eggs currently offered for sale are from suppliers that were not affected by the recall. You can buy these eggs with confidence.

James Farm brand eggs are packed by a number of egg processors across the country. Any of the James Farms eggs that were processed by Wright Farms were removed from display immediately upon notification of the recall.

### **From the Wright County Egg Co press release:**

Wright County Egg of Galt, Iowa is expanding its voluntary recall (original recall date: August 13, 2010) of specific Julian dates of shell eggs produced by their farms because they have the potential to be contaminated with *Salmonella*. *Salmonella* is an organism which can cause serious and sometimes fatal infections in young children, frail or elderly people, and others with weakened immune systems. Healthy persons infected with Salmonella often experience fever, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting and abdominal pain.

### **Foodservice Suppliers affected by the recall:**

Some eggs supplied to restaurants and food service customers by U.S. Foodservice, Sysco Corp. and Restaurant Depot (Jetro), are included in the Wright County Egg recall.

### **If you previously purchased James Farms eggs and want to check if they were included in the Recall:**

Every case of James Farm eggs shows a plant code (preceded by a P) and a Julian date (a three digit code).

The Dates and codes can be found stamped on the end of the egg carton or printed on the case label. The plant number begins with the letter P and then the number. The Julian date follows the plant number, for example: P-1720 223.

The product named in the expanded recall contains the following codes:

Julian dates ranging from 136 to 229 and plant numbers 1720 and 1942

Julian dates ranging from 136 to 225 and plant numbers 1026, 1413 and 1946.

If you did purchase the recalled product, you will receive a notification in the mail. If you have James Farms Eggs with the above codes you should dispose of those eggs and you will get credit from the Jetro or Restaurant Depot where you purchased the product.

**NOTE: The egg case label shown here is not part of the recall.**

**What customers should do to determine if eggs are part of the recall:**

For eggs to be part of the recall the answers to both #1 and #2 must be YES.

#1 Look at case label the plant code. This code is preceded by the letter P. Is the code one of the following: 1720,1942,1026,1413,1946. Any other code is not included in the recall.

If the plant code is included in the recall, then proceed to #2. If the plant code in number one is not one of the numbers listed above, the eggs cannot be part of the recall.

#2 Look at the three digit Julian code. For plant codes 1720 and 1942, is the Julian date between 136 and 229? For plant codes 1026,1413, and 1946; are the Julian dates between 136 and 225?

Remember, for the eggs to be part of the recall, the answers to BOTH #1 and #2 must be YES.
